20	A Yes, sir.
21	Q When?
22	A It was probably a couple years after the shooting.
23	Q Where did that encounter take place?
24	A At my brother Garren's house on Mulberry Street or

1	not Mulberry Street, right off of Mulberry Street. There is
2	an apartment two blocks down from where the shooting took
3	place or a block down where my brother Garren lived.
4	Q On, I'm sorry. What street did you say?

2	A Now, yes, sir.
3	Q Okay. When you were young were you running with the
4	Hendricks boys, were you a fairly religious person or not?
5	A No, I was a heathen.
6	Q You were a what?
7	A A heathen.
8	Q A heathen?
9	A Yes, sir.
10	Q Okay. Were the Hendricks heathens also?
11	A I think they'd put themself in that category, yeah.
12	Q All right. And you considered Jamie in that
13	category also, a heathen?
14	A Yes, sir.
15	Q What do you mean by heathen?
16	A Unchurched.
17	Q Not unchurched did you say?
18	A Yes, sir, people who rebel against the church.
19	Q Who do what against the church?
20	A Rebel against the church.
21	Q Rebel against the church. That's something other
22	than simply not attending regularly?
23	A No, sir, not attending because it says forsake not
24	the assembling of God's house and God's people so when you

don't go there, you put yourself on the outs. 1 Is that something from the Bible you just quoted? 2 Do you know the Bible, sir? 3 Maybe that's why I'm asking it. Did you quote that 4 from the Bible? 5 A Yes, sir. 6 I see. Now, you indicated that you spent a lot of 7 time with the Hendricks --8 Yes, sir. 9 -- crew, when you were young. Is that right? 10 A Yes, sir, in my teenage years and --11 Did you actually spend a lot of time with them or 12 did you simply know them? 13 I spent time with the Hendricks boys. 14 Q Because we've established you didn't spend anytime 15 with Jamie? 16 A No, sir. 17 You spent time with the Hendricks boys? 18 A Yes, sir. 19 So you knew Jamie through the Hendricks? 20 A No, sir. 21 Or knew of Jamie through the Hendricks? 22 No, sir, I've known Jamie from when we was little 23 kids. 24

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1	Q You've never spent anytime
2	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection, Your Honor; this has been
3	asked and answered multiple times.
4	THE COURT: Hold on, don't answer. The objection
5	is sustained. Move on.
6	MR. PICL:
7	Q How old were you when the first met the Hendricks?
8	A Junior high school.
9	Q So your age would have been about what?
10	A 12, 13.
11	Q Where did they live at that time?
12	A Same place they always lived, across the street from
13	Lincoln School. I believe that is Lee Street also.
14	Q Did you go to church on Easter, 1991?
15	A Yes, sir.
16	Q At the Pilgrim Holiness Church?
17	A Yes, sir.
18	Q What service did you attend? What time?
19	A We go to church then it was 6:30.
20	Q In the evening?
21	A Yes, sir. I was there in the morning too.
22	Q A.M. and evening. And you were getting pretty
23	religious at that time, is that correct?
24	A No, sir, I was trying to get pretty straightened out

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1	of everything I'd been into the rest of my life.
2	Q Did you ever use drugs?
3	A Yes, sir.
4	Q What type of drugs and when?
5	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection, Your Honor.
6	THE COURT: Objection sustained.
7	MR. PICL: May we approach?
8	THE COURT: Sure.
9	(The following proceedings were had at the
10	bench out of the hearing of the jury.)
11	MR. PICL: Am I not allowed to inquire into drug
12	use as far as bearing upon credibility?
13	THE COURT: Any response?
14	MS. GRIFFIN: It was actually at the time of the
15	event.
16	THE COURT: Right, that's the only way.
17	MR. PICL: At the time of when?
18	THE COURT: On the occasion
19	MR. PICL: Okay.
20	THE COURT: of the incident.
21	MS. GRIFFIN: All right.
22	(The following proceedings were had in the
23	presence and hearing of the jury.)
24	MR. PICL:

Q When you encountered the group of gentlemen, 1 including Jamie Snow, in the apartment on the night of the 2 shooting or the following night, had you used -- been using 3 drugs? 4 A No, sir. 5 I'm assuming one of the tenants of the Pilgrim 6 Holiness Church is you're not to be killing people. Is that 7 right? They don't approve of murder? 8 A No, sir. 9 Q I think that's also set out somewhere in the Bible, 10 right? 11 A Thou shall not kill. It's one of the Ten 12 Commandments. 13 Q It's a commandment? 14 A Yes, sir. 15 You -- did you think after this encounter in this 16 apartment with these gentlemen and Jamie, did you think 17 that, in fact, Jamie had killed someone at the Clark 18 station? 19 A Yes, sir. 20 So when did you call the police? 21 I never called the police. 22 Q Oh. Did you tell somebody in your church about it? 23 A No, sir. 24

1	Q Did you call the State's Attorney about it?
2	A No, sir.
3	Q Did you call the coroner about it?
4	A No, sir.
5	Q Call the fire department?
6	A No, sir.
7	Q Never called anybody, did you?
8	A No, sir.
9	Q The person in the corner in the room, you don't know
10	who that was, is that right?
11	A Excuse me?
12	Q Getting back to the encounter in the room that seems
13	to be the important thing here you've been talking about,
14	there was someone in the coroner you referred to, but you
15	didn't put a name on them?
16	A No, sir.
17	Q You don't know who it was?
18	A I can't remember, sir, no.
19	Q There was Dennis Hendricks and one of the other
20	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection, Your Honor.
21	THE COURT: Objection sustained.
22	MR. PICL:
23	Q Was Garren Bradford there?
24	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection.

1	THE COURT: The objection is sustained.
2	MR. PICL:
3	Q Garren Bradford lived there, didn't he?
4	A Yes, he did.
5	Q Was Garren Bradford there that night?
6	A No, sir.
7	Q Were you ever aware, Mr. Gaddis, of a reward being
8	offered for information in this case?
9	A I heard that there was a five thousand dollar
10	reward, yes, sir.  Q When did you hear that?  A live thousand dollar read the local paper.
11	Q When did you hear that?
12	A Years after it happened.
13	Q But before you called the police?
14	A I never called the police, sir.
15	Q Before the police found you, is that right?
16	A Yes, sir.
17	A Yes, sir.  Q You were aware there was a reward.  Q You were aware there was a reward.
18	A Is there any way that I could have a drink of water,
19	please?
20	THE COURT: Yeah, Bob will get you one.
21	MR. PICL:
22	Q On the 26th of August, 1999 did you did you phone
23	Detective Katz?
24	A I don't remember if I did or not, sir. Did I phone

1	Danny Katz, yeah, but I don't know a day.
2	Q So you did, in fact, call the police at some point?
3	A Yes, sir, in 1999.
4	Q The room that you entered and encountered these men
5	at the apartment at Lee and Market, describe it's lighting
6	for me, please.
7	A It has two windows for natural light, and one in the
8	ceiling, sir.  Q A window in the ceiling or a light?  A A light in the ceiling, sir.  Q Was the light on?  A I don't believe so.  Q And you encountered these people either late in the
9	Q A window in the ceiling or a light?
10	A A light in the ceiling, sir. A bunch if
11	Q Was the light on?
12	A I don't believe so. $\gamma^{\prime}$
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14	evening of the shooting or the following evening. Is that
15	correct?
16	A Yes, sir.
17	Q From your own knowledge you don't know if Jamie Snow
18	shot Bill Little on the 31st of March, 91, do you?
19	A From my own knowledge?
20	Q Yeah.
21	A Yes, sir NO
22	Q You were there and saw the shooting?
23	A No, sir.
24	Q That's what I mean.

1	A No, sir.
2	Q Did you see Bill Little shot?
3	A No, sir.
4	Q Okay. So you don't know who shot him, do you?
5	A Yeah, Jamie Snow Wulshit.
6	Q You didn't, from your own
7	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection, Your Honor. We're
8	getting an argument. He's asking one question. He's
9	answered. Now they're arguing.
10	THE COURT: He may answer the last question,
11	Mr. Picl. Would you just rephrase that again? I think
12	there is some confusion.
13	MR. PICL:
14	Q Did you see Jamie Snow shoot Bill Little?
15	A No, sir.
16	Q Did you hear Jamie Snow say he shot Bill Little?
17	A No, sir.
18	Q What was the name, if you will, of Jamie's
19	stepfather who raised him?
20	A I don't know for sure, but I believe it was Bill.
21	Q Jamie's stepfather is here in the courtroom. Would
22	you point him out, please?  MS. GRIFFIN: Objection.
23	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection.
24	THE COURT: Objection sustained.

1	MR. PICL:
2	Q When you knew Jamie Snow, where did he live here in
3	town?
4	A In the trailer court. I believe it was Mobileland.
5	Q Where did he live when he was seven when you first
6	met him?
7	A I don't know if he was living with his father or
8	not. I know his mom lived on the corner of Park and Empire.
9	Q Mr. Gaddis, can you name a single person who has
10	ever seen you alone with Jamie Snow anywhere?
11	Q Mr. Gaddis, can you name a single person who has ever seen you alone with Jamie Snow anywhere? Por seel or with MS. GRIFFIN: Objection, he's already asked and
12	answered the question.
13	THE COURT: Hold on. The objection is sustained.
14	MR. PICL:
15	Q I do I am puzzled
16	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection. He can ask questions.
17	He can't make comments about himself.
18	THE COURT: I'll sustain it. Please rephrase the
19	question.
20	MR. PICL:
21	Q In 1991 when you believed, according to your
22	testimony, that Jamie Snow shot and killed Bill Little, you
23	I believe have told us that you were a Christian at that
24	time, a religious man?

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1	A Yes, sir.
2	Q Was there some particular reason you didn't contact
3	the authorities with your information?
4	A No, sir.
5	Q Knowing the Hendricks boys as you have, are you
6	aware of their reputation generally for telling the truth?
7	MS. GRIFFIN: Objection.
8	THE COURT: Objection sustained.
9	MR. PICL:
10	Q You did describe them to us as heathen. Is that
11	correct?
12	A Yes, sir.
13	Q Do you feel you have a pretty good reputation for
14	telling the truth?
15	A Now, yes, sir.
16	Q Now, you do?
17	A Yes, sir.
18	Q From 1991 until 1999 when you talked to the police
19	did you believe you had any sort of religious or spiritual
20	duty to report what you thought you knew about this crime?
21	A The Bible says work out your own salvation with fear
22	and trembling. WIFF
23	Q The answer is no?
24	A No, sir.

MR. PICL: I have nothing else, thank you. 1 2 THE COURT: Miss Griffin? 3 REDIRECT EXAMINATION BY MS. GRIFFIN: 4 5 O Mr. Gaddis, based on your last remark and your last 6 7 inquiry by defense counsel, do you believe it's your 8 responsibility to make people accountable or hold people accountable for wrongdoing? 9 MR. PICL: Objection, beyond the scope. 10 THE COURT: Overruled. 11 12 MS. GRIFFIN: 13 What --What --14 A Is that your job or your responsibility to hold 15 16 people accountable for their wrong doings? A Actually a Christian's job, a minister's job is to 17 make sure that there soul is right and nothing else really 18 19 matters if he gets a death sentence or whatever. We'll stand before a great judge one day, and that's how I believe 20 that God works out the judgment of those things. 21 22 Q Now, counsel asked you if you ever saw Jamie Snow again after that encounter in the bedroom at Dennis 23 24 Hendricks' apartment, and you indicated one time. Is that

1	correct?
2	A Once or twice at my brother Garren's house, yes,
3	ma'am.
4	Q And you never talked to him. Is that correct?
5	A No.
6	Q Now, did you ever call the police on your own and
7	say, hey, I've got information on this case?
8	A Never.
9	Q Okay. Now, when, in fact, counsel asked you about
10	calling Detective Katz or anyone else, who initiated the
11	contact between the police and you?
12	A Danny Katz.
13	Q And would it be accurate to say that you had spoken
14	about what you knew to someone else unconnected with the
15	police or anything?
16	A Yes, they asked me about it.
17	MR. PICL: Objection, that's hearsay.
18	THE COURT: Hold on. Have you finished the
19	question?  MS. GRIFFIN: Yes.  New for the percent of the percent o
20	MS. GRIFFIN: Yes.
21	THE COURT: Okay. Do you have any response?
22	MS. GRIFFIN: I'm not offering this for the truth.
23	I'm offering it to show how it is it came to be in contact
24	with the witness and I'm not asking

THE COURT: His answer, though, was beginning to 1 relate the statement so that's why I'll sustain it. 2 MS. GRIFFIN: 3 You talked to someone else? 4 Yes, ma'am. 5 About what you had seen that night. Is that 6 correct? 7 A Yes, ma'am. 8 And after you told someone else who was not a police 9 officer, not connected with the police, you ended up getting 10 a call from the police then. Is that correct? 11 A Yes, ma'am. 12 Q And that was in the summer of 1999? 13 A Yes, ma'am. 14 And when counsel went through his litany of whether 15 you had talked to the police, the coroner, the fire 16 department, I believe he ended up saying you didn't tell 17 anyone, and I just want to clarify I believe you testified 18 on direct --19 A I told my wife. 20 -- you told your wife. Is that correct? 21 A Yes, ma'am. 22 MS. GRIFFIN: I don't have any other questions. 23 Thank you. 24

1	THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Picl?
2	
3	RECROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. PICL:
4	
5	Q And she called the police then?
6	A No, sir.
7	MR. PICL: Oh. Nothing else.
8	THE COURT: Miss Griffin, anything further?
9	MS. GRIFFIN: No, your Honor.
10	THE COURT: All right. You may step down. Thank
11	you.
12	
13	(Witness excused.)

15	MS. GRIFFIN: Take a break, a short break.
16	THE COURT: You don't have a short witness?
17	MS. GRIFFIN: No.
18	THE COURT: Oh, all right. We'll take a ten
